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***Student Facilitator/Reporter Role**

Twenty-four of the symposium attendees will be clinical psychology students or interns, and they will have a special role. We will pair the students (12 pairs in all) and assign each pair to a faculty 'coach.' Each team will be facilitator/recorder for each of the four discussion sessions throughout the entire symposium.

The faculty 'coach' will stay with their team through all 4 discussion sessions, and give feedback on their implementation of the role---jumping in if/when the student is either too passive (not allowing all to participate, allowing a dominant speaker to monopolize the floor, etc.) or too active (directing discussion, defining who speaks when, etc.). Also, the 'coach' will help students learn how to track themes, opinions on themes, and affective responses to themes so that when we review the transcripts of the discussion groups we will have some real-time notes to help place the disembodied words into a context.

Linda Garcia-Shelton will meet with students beginning Friday at 10:00am to define and discuss their two roles, and explain the structure and use of a note sheet adapted from anthropology research that organizes these 3 kinds of important data. Each faculty coach is invited to participate in this session.

At 11:00am each faculty Coach will meet their team and begin to work with/mentor them. Of course, coaches can come at 10:00am as well, so they can hear the charge given to the students.

Note: All plenary presentations and small group discussions will be audiotaped and later transcribed for use in drafting several papers on training issues for public mental health practice.

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
